Several staff changes have occurred in the Outpatient Programs worth noting in this Spring Newsletter.

We have hired a third intake staff member, Katie Gilbert, a licensed clinical social worker, who will work with our other intake staff, Valeria Wainwright and Twanya Fuches. We will utilize her clinical background, to improve the screening process and appropriate placement for patients into the adult or the child and adolescent clinics or to outside resources. Please welcome Katie to our intake team.

Our very capable, advanced practice nurse, Anna Bower, has left the program for a practice near her home in Indiana. Anna was critical in managing our Monday Afternoon Clinic (MAC), which treats patients with primarily psychotic disorders. She also managed all the patients receiving depot, long-acting antipsychotic medications and all those on Clozapine, a medication requiring up to weekly blood monitoring. Anna saw individual patients and ran several groups. She was also instrumental in our quality management program. She will continue to teach residents in group and family therapy. CLINICAL MISSION: C&A PSYCHIATRY



Sharon Hirsch, M.D., Director of C&A Psychiatry. The Section of Child and Adolescent Psychiatry is out in the community! Thanks to a grant from the Women's Board, we have been working with Dr. Icy Cade Bell and the Comer Children's Hospital Mobile Unit in two area schools, Hyde Park Career Academy and Paul Revere Elementary School. One of

the main tenets of the mobile unit is to improve the health of children and, thus, the strength and the future of the community as a whole. A major part of this must be the child's mental health. We consult in these two schools to increase the knowledge and understanding of psychiatric illness. In consultation with students, parents and teachers, we have offered a series of free educational lectures presented by senior Child and Adolescent Psychiatry Residents. Topics range from supporting someone in a time of grief to dealing with gang violence. We also offer individualized consultation to teachers and staff in the classrooms as requested.

In these days of dwindling resources, we know we can not provide treatment to everyone. We have delighted in our ability to help identification and understanding of psychiatric illness. It is a great joy to see children moved from the category of 'troublemaker' to 'troubled' so that they may receive assistance and become productive students once again. We have been fortunate indeed to team up with the Mobile Unit, Paul Revere and Hyde Park in this endeavor.

EDUCATION MISSION



<u>Deborah</u> <u>Spitz, M.D., Mission</u> <u>Director of Education.</u> Each year the Department sponsors Education Day, a mini-retreat where faculty and residents can focus on an educational issue in depth. Last year, speaker Franklin Medio, Ph.D., conducted a very successful workshop on

Evaluation. This year the topic will be Feedback--an Essential Skill for Educators. In spite of the fact that we know feedback is essential in the development of trainees, many faculty and residents are not comfortable giving and getting feedback. Residency Training Directors sometimes complain that they get more information in the hallways than on evaluation forms. So, how can we operationalize the goals and objectives, and thus the progress, of each clinic or rotation or supervisory setting, so as to know exactly what to expect to learn or teach? How do trainees assess their own learning needs and articulate them so as best to direct their teachers' attention? And how can faculty be as specific as possible in speaking with trainees about strengths and areas to work on, and also get feedback themselves? Mark your calendars! This year's Education Day, on Monday June 14 from 1pm to 4:30 pm, will address just such issues through workshops and discussions.

We had a very successful match in all of the training programs, and we welcome the new interns, residents and child fellows who will start at the end of June. More about our new trainees in the next edition of the newsletter.

FACULTY SPOTLIGHT



<u>Shona Vas, Ph.D.</u> is an Assistant Professor of Psychiatry & Behavioral Neuroscience. She received her Ph.D. in Clinical Psychology from Loyola University in Chicago in 2002. She completed her clinical internship at Illinois Masonic in 2002 and joined the Department here in 2004. She is the Director of the Cog-

nitive-Behavioral Therapy (CBT) Program and the Associate Director for of Psychology Training. Dr. Vas provides clinical services for patients, primarily those with mood and anxiety disorders. Dr. Vas conducts individual, couples, and group assessment and psychotherapy using cognitive-behavioral principles and other evidence based treatments. She is actively involved in the Educational mission of our Department. Dr. Vas teaches an introductory and advanced course in CBT for our PGY-2s and 3s and runs a monthly CBT case conference attended by trainees at different levels. She coordinates a 9-month long Professional Issues Seminar for our psychology interns and also provides individual supervision for psychology interns and externs. Dr. Vas also presents monthly lectures on CBT for MS-3s completing their clerkship in Psychiatry. In addition to her clinical and educational work, Dr. Vas consults to the Department of Obstetrics & Gynecology; Section on Reproductive Endocrinology & Infertility. She is collaborating on a research project with Dr. Mary Stephenson, the Director of the Recurrent Pregnancy Loss Clinic to examine how couples are impacted by and cope with recurrent miscarriage. CLINICAL PROGRAM SPOTLIGHT



The solid organ transplant groups at University of Chicago Hospitals are supported by the transplant psychiatry program in the Department of Psychiatry. *Michael Marcangelo, M.D.*, Assistant Professor of Psychiatry and Behavioral Neuroscience and Director of Medical Student Education at the Priztker School of Medicine, is an active member

of the heart, liver, and lung transplant teams. The weekly transplant psychiatry clinic provides both diagnostic evaluations for potential recipients and post-transplant patients and ongoing psychiatric care for patients in all phases of the transplant process. Patients are also evaluated in the hospital when the acuity of their illness does not allow for outpatient evaluation. Each week, the transplant psychiatry program is represented along with surgeons, medical subspecialists, nursing, and allied health professionals at the multidisciplinary meetings at which decisions are made about the best treatment course for individual patients. Recently, a new clinical psychologist was recruited to provide psychological services and substance abuse treatment to transplant patients. In addition to their clinical work, the transplant psychiatry program also has ongoing research trials to evaluate the effectiveness of interventions for patients in need of transplant and their impact on quality of life.

TEACHING FACULTY SPOTLIGHT



<u>Josh Kellman, M.D.</u> is a Clinical Associate in the Department of Psychiatry & Behavioral Neuroscience, Section of Child and Adolescent Psychiatry. Dr. Kellman spends Wednesday mornings with us teaching the Development Course, leading the discussion in the multidisciplinary case conference, and supervising residents. He also participates

in the on-call pool, where he supervises C&A, and General Psychiatry, residents. Dr. Kellman has a private practice, primarily psychoanalytic in nature, in Wilmette, IL. In addition to being Board Certified in C&A Psychiatry, Dr. Kellman is also a fully trained psychoanalyst who teaches at The Chicago Institute for Psychoanalysis. Dr. Kellmans' C&A training was at the University of Chicago. He completed his General Psychiatry training at the University of Michigan. Dr. Kellman continues to be active in the Chicago and American Psychoanalytic Societies, the American Psychiatric Society, and has won numerous awards including the Zanvel Klein Training Award from the C&A Psychiatry Section at the University of Chicago. RESEARCH PROGRAM SPOTLIGHT



The Human Behavioral Pharmacology Laboratory (HBPL) is directed by *Harriet de Wit, Ph.D.,* Professor of Psychiatry & Behavioral Neuroscience. The HBPL conducts research studies, funded by the National Institute on Drug Abuse, investigating the moodaltering, behavioral and physiological effects of psychoactive drugs in human

volunteers. The studies have several goals. Some of the studies investigate the nature and determinants of individual differences in responses to drugs. One important source of differences across individuals is variations in the genes involved in the drug's mechanism of action. Thus, in collaboration with Abraham Palmer of the Department of Human Genetics, we have examined associations between the mood-altering effects of amphetamine and variations in a number of genes involved in the receptor actions of the drug. In other studies, we are investigating the effects of drugs on responses to emotional stimuli in the environment. Thus, in addition to producing direct mood effects, such as feelings of high and euphoria, drugs of abuse may also alter perception of positive or negative stimuli in the environment, and this, in turn, may also affect drug use. We are investigating these relationships with drugs such as amphetamine, ecstasy and tetrahydrocannabinol. Scientists, Emma Childs, Megin Wardle and Amy Yang, as well as three graduate students, Mike Ballard, Nick Wignall and Margarit Datvian, also conduct studies related to the laboratory's goals.


